# Backyard Tips from Birds & Blooms....

- Remember, if you want to grow garlic, plant
  it at the end of summer or in early fall for a
  harvest next summer. (It is so easy and
  worth it—fabulous taste!)
- Even if you haven't had luck attracting hummingbirds this summer, don't give up.
   Juveniles will be looking for a place to eat, so you could attract visitors at any time.
- Don't deadhead coneflower, sunflowers and native thistles. Goldfinches love the seeds!
- Use a pumpkin as a container. It makes a lovely resting place for a pot of mums. Instead of filling the pumpkin with dirt, just drop in the plastic container.

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## Weeds, Weeds!

#### From Linda Kunesh

I recently had the pleasure of attending an informal gathering of Master Gardeners to visit with Richard Hentschel, Horticulture Educator at the U of I Extension Services. Here's what he had to say about all those weeds this year:



The drought of 2012 allowed weeds to become more competitive and established in flower beds and lawns and set a lot of seed in the process. This occurred throughout our region and has continued into 2014. It is best to tackle those weeds NOW while they are young, rather than wait till next year. If you can't dig out the weeds, be sure to at least remove all seed heads and dispose of them in a landscape waste bag (do not compost). Next year, start early and do not let them get established. While it's not usually recommended that you use herbicides around your flowers, some of the weeds this year are so prevalent and numerous, you may need to consider using a product containing glyphosate as a non selective trans-locatable treatment. Follow all package directions carefully so you do not harm your ornamentals.

### Zapple Bars—Linda Kunesh

(a great way to use those giant zucchini - everyone will think that they are eating apples)

5 1/2 cups peeled and diced zucchini (be sure to omit any seeds or pulp)

1/2 cup lemon juice

2/3 cup light brown sugar

1/4 tsp ground nutmeg

1 tsp ground cinnamon

In a non-reactive saucepan combine zucchini and lemon juice. Bring to a boil over medium-high heat. Reduce heat and simmer until tender, about 10 minutes. Add brown sugar, cinnamon, and nutmeg. Simmer stirring 1 - 2 minutes until slightly thickened. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Butter a 9" x 13" pan.

2 1/2 cups all-purpose flour

1 c. unsalted butter, cut into pieces

1 1/4 cups sugar


1 tsp vanilla extract

1/2 tsp salt

Combine flour, sugar, and salt. Add butter and cut in until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. (can be done in a food processor but I just use a pastry blender). Mix in vanilla. Press half of mixture into bottom of pan. Bake 10 minutes. Spread zucchini mixture over crust. Evenly distribute remaining flour mixture on top of zucchini. Bake 35 - 40 minutes, until golden brown. Cool completely before cutting.

# 10 Things You Aren't Feeding Your Birds Yet (Birds & Blooms September 2014)

- 1. Peanut Butter- Just smear it on tree bark.
- 2. Jelly-Grape is best. Put it in any shallow container, even an empty orange half.
- 3. Fruit-orange halves, berries and raisins.
- 4. Mealworms-feed them a dozen or so at a time. Container must be couple of inches deep or they will crawl out!
- 5. Roasted Seeds-pumpkin or squash. Make some for yourself and then some for the birds.
- 6. Baked Egg Shells-must be scrubbed and baked to remove pathogens. Crush and add to seeds or sprinkle on the ground.
- 7. Compost-some larger birds like to poke around in the food scraps.
- 8. Stale Nuts- do watch salt content, shake off excess in a brown paper bags.
- 9. Plants-garden for your birds! Plant flowers and leave their seed heads for the winter.
- 10. Suet Creations-many recipes out there to try. Some cooked, some not.

# Did You Plant Elephant Ears This Summer?

They need protection from freezing temperatures. Better Homes and Gardens (August 2014) recommends that you dig up bulbs before the first frost and cut off foliage. Remove soils from roots, then set labeled clumps in a dry, cool place to cure for a week or so. Next, place bulbs in a cardboard box filled with dry peat moss. Store in a cool area that stays above freezing, such as an attached garage.
