When I was young, we would bundle up every year, ride the "L" train downtown to eat lunch under the Walnut Room Christmas tree and see the magnificent story-telling store windows. The tree was a fresh one and several stories high.

Marshall Fields started decorating windows in 1897 as an elaborate toy display. In 1944 they created themed windows that spanned along State Street to tell a story. The first story was "The Night Before Christmas". Themed windows were a big hit.

Two years later a mascot named Uncle Mistletoe was added to compete with Montgomery Ward's Rudolph the Red-Nosed Reindeer. Uncle Mistletoe was a mix of the creator's favorite uncle, Charles Dickens and a dash of an Arabian Knight. His job was to keep track of all the nice children for Santa. He was so popular that he was featured in a weekly children's television program along with Aunt Holly. They were soon joined by Freddie Field Mouse and his wife Marcia. The windows featured their growing family with four new baby mice.

The store was bought by Dayton Hudson in the 80's and then Macy's in 2006. Windows have featured Cinderella, The Nutcracker and even Harry Potter.

This year the theme has a blue reindeer named Tiptoe who is too shy to fly and finally believes he can. The story-telling windows are one of Chicago's longest running holiday displays.

Plant America Community Grant Final Report

Bloomingdale Garden Club, in collaboration with University of Illinois (U of I) Extension DuPage Master Gardeners, comprise the DuPage Care Center



(DPCC) Garden Team. The Team, along with strategic partners, accomplished the following for DPCC with the \$1,000 award of the National Garden Clubs, Inc. Plant America Community Grant:

Most of the Pollinator Garden at DPCC was planted in the fall of 2020 with more than 85 pollinator plants/shrubs donated by Midwest Groundcovers. Later that fall and in the spring of 2021, bulbs and additional pollinator-friendly annuals were planted, along with fertilizer purchased and used for the plantings. Additional supplies were purchased.

A "Nature's Healing Art Pole," 18 dwarf butterfly bushes, and additional perennials and native



plants were purchased and installed in the Resident Garden.

Telescoping watering wands were purchased and installed on strategically placed hoses throughout the garden area.

Organic soil and mulch were installed in the Pollinator Garden.



Bloomingdale Garden Club and DPCC Foundation (DPCCF) committed additional money for plants.

Mulch was purchased in October with DPCCF funds and spread throughout the new Pollinator Garden by the DPCC Garden Team.

Quotes were received from potential irrigation system companies. However, given the nature of the plants donated and since many were "natives" we decided to forgo the irrigation system and invest in the garden itself.



Signage for and information about the plants were developed and displayed in the Pollinator Garden and the informational kiosk.

The Secret Garden Gazette, a 4-6-page publication to connect Resident Gardeners to the gardening experience and the DPCC Garden Team to the Resident Gardeners was initiated by two Master Gardeners. It was

launched last year since Master Gardeners were not able to teach face-to-face lessons due to the pandemic. Articles provided educational content, as well as some articles for fun, along with photos of the garden. Contributors included a number of Master Gardeners, along with those who also are members of the Bloomingdale Garden Club. Paper copies of these editions were delivered to resident gardeners and read aloud on the PA system. These efforts were well-received by

the residents. In June, 2021, we sent out the 10th edition.

Seven of the 10 issues featured articles on pollinators and/or the new Pollinator Garden. Some of the issues also noted the generous donation from the Plant America Community Grant Program.

Plot-to-Plate Garden 2021

Thanks to everyone's help, the Plot-to-Plate Garden had a record year for number of pounds of produce delivered. Our harvesting yielded at total of 595 pounds! Our five top poundage producers were tomatoes (187 lbs.), onions (65.5 lbs.), tomatillos (57.75 lbs.), green peppers (51.25 lbs.), and salad greens (44.25 lbs.). In addition, we also grew green beans, beets, broccoli, carrots, cucumbers, garlic, herbs, peas, hot peppers, potatoes, radishes, winter squash, and zucchini. Four of our garden club members (Laurie, Akhila, Cheryl, and Gail) gave us another 108 pounds of produce from their gardens to add to our donations. We split our donations between the Bloomingdale Church Food Pantry, Bloomingdale Township Food Pantry, and Family in Faith Food Pantry.

The Plot-to-Plate committee has cleaned up the garden and stored all our equipment and signage. We are done for this year and have already met to review the season and make tentative plans for 2022. We hope that those of you who



helped in 2021 will be willing to join us again in the new year and those of you who didn't will consider being part of this project.

Holiday Recipes

Cathy Kreis (A delicious holiday spirit.)

Cranberry-Lime Vodka

MAKES 3 CUPS (Make up to 1 day or a week in advance.)

3 ½ cups fresh cranberries
½ cup sugar
¼ cup fresh lime juice
3 cups vodka
Strips of lime zest from 1 lime



Heat 3 cups of the cranberries, the sugar, and the lime juice in a medium saucepan over medium heat until boiling. Reduce heat to low and simmer until most of the cranberries pop, about 5 minutes. Remove from heat and cool completely. Add the strips of lime zest to a jar with a tight-fitting lid, then pour in the vodka. Spoon the cooled cranberry mixture into the jar. Put the lid on the jar and let the mixture macerate (soften) in the refrigerator at least one day or up to a week. When you're ready to package it, strain vodka through a sieve into bottles with tight-fitting lids. Add the remaining ½ cup of fresh cranberries.

Candied Pecans

- 1 cup white sugar
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 egg white
- 1 tablespoon water
- 1 pound pecan halves
- Preheat oven to 250° F.

Mix sugar, cinnamon, and salt together in a bowl.

Whisk egg white and water together in a separate bowl until frothy. Toss pecans in the egg white mixture. Mix sugar mixture into pecan mixture until pecans are evenly coated. Spread coated pecans onto a baking sheet.


Bake in the preheated oven, stirring every 15 minutes, until pecans are evenly browned, 1 hour.

Kolaczki Polish Cookie

Prep time: 1 hour 5 minutes Cooking time: 45 minutes MAKES: 5 DOZEN

- 8 ounces cream cheese
- 1 ½ cups butter
- 3 cups flour



1 – 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ cups filling, such as fruit preserves or jam, nuts or poppy seed

Instructions

Cream the cream cheese and butter until light and fluffy.



Stir in the flour and salt.

Wrap in plastic wrap and chill for one hour

Preheat oven to 350 degrees

Roll out the dough by first dusting the mat or countertop with granular sugar

Roll to ¼ inch and cut into 2 inch squares. If you have a fluted pastry cutter zig-zag along the edges of the cookies

Place a teaspoon of filling in the center of each square

Fold over opposite corners and seal well

Bake for 15 minutes or until corners just begin to brown

Cool on a rack and dust with powdered sugar.

Birdseed Ornaments

2 tbsp coconut oil 1 cup birdseed

Measure the coconut oil into a microwave safe bowl. Microwave until oil melts, about 30 sec. Add birdseed and mix well.

Place cookie cutters on a small parchment-lined baking tray. Fill with the mixture. Using a straw or skewer, poke a hole in the top of each ornament.

Refrigerate until ornaments harden. Carefully remove the cookie cutters. Insert a piece of ribbon through the hole to create a loop. Hang your ornaments outside and wait for the birds to arrive. PA


