2023 Annual Meeting Flatbread Recipes

Roasted Vegetable, Herbed Goat Cheese & Hot Honey Drizzle

Debbie Matuszak saw this recipe on the Today Show.

2 red onions, sliced into ½-inch wedges
2 red bell peppers, sliced into ½-inch strips
4 carrots, sliced into ½-inch coins
2 eggplants, cut into ¾ -inch cubes
¼ cup olive oil, divided
2 tablespoons balsamic vinegar
kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper
8 ounces plain goat cheese (blended with ¼ cup

chopped basil + ¼ cup chopped parsley) 3 flatbreads (pita or naan work well)

2 garlic cloves, halved 5 ounces arugula hot honey (get at Jewel) flaky sea salt for sprinkling

1. Preheat your oven to 425° F. In a large mixing bowl, combine red onion, bell peppers, carrots, eggplant, 2 tablespoons olive oil, balsamic vinegar, salt and pepper. Toss to combine.

2. Divide veggies between two sheet trays. Place in the oven and roast until golden brown and tender, about 15 to 20 minutes. Be sure to toss veggies halfway through to ensure they cook evenly.

3. Make herb goat cheese spread: In another mixing bowl, combine goat cheese, chopped basil, chopped parsley, salt and pepper. Mix to combine. Set aside while you prepare your flatbreads.

4. Using a grill pan or large skillet set on top of a skillet over medium-high heat, toast flatbreads on both sides until warmed though and slightly browned, about 2 to 3 minutes each.

5. Once flatbreads comes off the grill pan or skillet, rub with the cut side of a garlic clove.

6. Build flatbreads: Spread 1/3 of the goat cheese mixture on the top of the slightly warm flatbread.

Add 1/3 of the roasted veggies and a handful of arugula. Repeat process with other 2 flatbreads.7. Drizzle flatbreads with hot honey and sprinkle with flaky sea salt. Cut into pieces before serving.

BLT with Avocado

This recipe and the following were taken from Pinterest.

2 flatbreads or Stonefire naan
1 tablespoon olive oil
2 cloves garlic, thinly sliced
8 oz. fresh mozzarella
8 oz. bacon, cooked and
crumbled
1 cup halved grape tomatoes



1 cup fresh greens (arugula is my fave) Cilantro Avocado Lime Sauce (recipe below)

1. Heat oven to 425° F. Place flatbreads on baking sheet and brush with olive oil. Top with thinly sliced garlic.

2. Add fresh mozzarella, dividing it evenly between the two flatbreads.

3. Bake for about 5 minutes or until the cheese is melted.

4. Add bacon to the flatbreads and bake for another 3-5 minutes.

Top with grape tomatoes, creamy avocado sauce, and fresh arugula. Enjoy!

Cilantro Avocado Lime Sauce

2 avocados, pitted and diced ¼ cup sour cream ¼ cup fresh cilantro leaves juice of 2-3 limes Kosher salt, to taste splash of water

Add avocado, sour cream, cilantro, lime juice, a large pinch of salt, and a splash of water to a food processor. Process until it is a smooth, creamy consisteny. Season to taste with salt and enjoy!

Eat Your Veggies! More Flatbread Recipes

Bacon, Goat Cheese & Fig Jam

8 oz refrigerated pizza dough 2 tbsp fig jam 1 tbsp water 1 tbsp olive oil ¼ cup + 1 tbsp crumbled goat cheese, divided ½ cup shredded mozzarella cheese 2 pieces bacon, cooked crisp and crumbled Handful of baby arugula Squeeze of fresh lemon juice



1. Preheat oven to 425° F. Thaw dough 30 minutes before using. Let rest on floured surface under a dish towel.

2. Whisk fig jam and water in a small bowl. Set aside.

3. Stretch dough on a lightly floured surface to a 10-12 inch oval. Gently transfer to parchment paper.

4. Brush olive oil over dough (including the edges). Spread fig jam mixture over the dough, leaving a $\frac{1}{2}$ " inch border for the crust.

5. Top dough with ¼ cup goat cheese and shredded mozzarella. Top with the crumbled bacon.

6. Transfer flatbread to oven and bake 8-12 minutes until crust is golden and the cheese is bubbly. While the flatbread is cooking, toss the arugula with the lemon juice. Set aside.

7. Remove from oven and cool on a rack. Sprinkle arugula and remaining tbsp of goat cheese on top. Cut into wedges and serve.



Mushroom, Goat Cheese & Balsamic Glaze

2 Naan slices whole 8 oz mushrooms thinly sliced ½ yellow onion thinly sliced ½ tbsp butter 2 oz goat cheese crumbles ½ cup balsamic vinegar 1 and ½ tbsp brown sugar 2 teaspoons dried thyme 1 tbsp olive oil Salt and pepper



For the glaze

1. Mix balsamic vinegar with brown sugar in a saucepan over medium heat, stirring constantly until sugar has dissolved.

2. Bring to a boil, reduce heat to low, and simmer until glaze is reduced by half, about 20 minutes. Set aside.

For flatbreads

1. Preheat oven to 425° F.

2. Melt butter in a large skillet over medium heat. Add mushrooms and onions and saute for 3 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add thyme, salt, and pepper, and saute until onions are translucent and mushrooms are cooked and soft. Set aside.

3. Brush tops of the Naan with the olive, then add half of the mushrooms/onions to each top and sprinkle with 1 oz goat cheese crumbles.

4. Place on parchment lined baking sheets and bake for 6-8 minutes or until cheese is softed.*You do not want to overcook so watch carefully for browning on the bread. Remove from oven.

5. Drizzle 1 TBS of balsamic glaze over each flatbread. Cut into halves or fourths and serve.

Cleaning & Sharpening Tools by Ken Benson

Notes by Debbie Matuszak, Kbenson22@comcast.net

- Keep tool locked when sharpening knives, keep finger on blade and pull toward you
- All horticultural knives are sharpened on one side only (inside)
- Use leverage on shovels, pushing back and forth
- Ace Hardware sharpens tools
- Respect your tools, they are sharp!
- Lubricate with WD40
- Honing stone is used to sharpen blades
- Obsidian (volcanic glass) is sharpest substance
- Sharpen loppers on one edge only!
- Wear good protective gloves (toughest ones) while shapening tools
- Use WD40, Goo Gone, or silicone spray to clean
- Superzilla gets rust off
- To clean a file use WD40 and a wire brush

- Never sharpen a serrated edge
- Hedge shears should be very tight, when blades close together
- Metal files comes in coarse, medium and fine
- If the handles are too close together when closed on long loppers, they are referred to as knuckle busters. Don't use those!
- Use double tooth saw for dead wood
- Use Green Sand and Mycorrhizae to increase your garden's vegetable production
- Sharpen the inside edge of a blade and the outside edge of a hoe
- Stop using lawn spraying service on your grass
- Use the right tools for the right job
- Lawnmower blades should be sharpened at Ace after every ten hours of operation
