An Overripe Banana Is The Secret To Attracting More Hummingbirds To Your Yard





To entice hummingbirds to frequent your yard, position this homemade sweet treat in a shallow dish, or feeder, ideally suspended close to flowers or other natural food sources for hummingbirds. Regular maintenance is crucial—make it a habit to clean and replenish the feeder frequently to thwart the growth of mold and bacteria. This routine upkeep ensures that the hummingbirds have access to fresh and safe nectar, encouraging their continued visits to your outdoor space.

Ingredients

1 overripe banana
1/4 cup of granulated sugar
1 cup of water
You will also need a blender, saucepan, strainer
and a container for storage.

Instructions

1. Peel the overripe banana and cut it into small pieces and place banana pieces in a blender.

2. Add the granulated sugar and water to the blender and blend the mixture until smooth.

3. Pour the mixture into a saucepan and bring it to a gentle boil. Simmer the mixture for 5 to 10 minutes, stirring occasionally.

4. Remove the saucepan from the heat and allow the mixture to cool. Once cooled, strain the mixture to remove any solid pieces. Transfer the liquid to a clean container for storage.

Customers who submit a Pre-Sale Order have the first opportunity to select from the vast array of baskets and additional plants when they come to pick up their pre-sale order on Friday morning.

Gift Certificates in any denomination are available for purchase. Recipients of the gift certificates must redeem them at our 2024 sale. These make great Mother's Day (May 12th) and birthday gifts and are suitable to mark any occasion/event. Day-of-Sale prices apply. 2024 Guidelines For Perennials

We LOVE getting plants from our Garden Club Members and their friends for our Plant Sales. Below are a few "guidelines" we'd appreciate you following to ease your preparation and help our Garden Club get the most profit we can while giving our customers high quality, member-grown plants.

SATURDAY, APRIL 27TH

Preparation for Plant Labels and Signs

(1 week before potting party)

Email Carole Lockerbie at **carolelockerbie@ yahoo.com** to let her know what plants you will provide, how many, their height and spread, bloom time, and their growing conditions. Please include in your email the common name, along with the botanical name if you know it. Carole is preparing labels for the plant markers. (If you know that she already has a label on file, you can just let her know the name and how many plants you'll bring—no need for all the extra info!) An example is shown below:

Quantity: 3 – 'Autumn Joy' Sedum (Herbstfreude). Pink (changing to rust) flowers in flat heads; fleshy green leaves. 24" H x 18" W. Full sun or partial shade. Flowers August-September.

IMPORTANT: We are aware that there may be "jumping worms" in our area. These pests are extremely invasive and detrimental to our gardens. If you know you had jumping worms in your yard, we **CANNOT** accept any plants from you. Thank you for your cooperation.

SATURDAY, MAY 4TH • 10 to 3 PM Perennial Plant Potting Party

It will be held at the Bloomingdale Park District Maintenance Building. Bring plants in bags or boxes and members will help get them potted. We cannot accept any plants that are not identified. This is a great time to accept or trade perennials with other club members. Just remember though, once the plants are "potted," they belong to the club and can only be purchased.

Be sure to check a perennial book or the internet to see if your plant can be divided in the Spring!

If you decide to dig up and pot your plants yourself, please follow these GUIDELINES:

1. Plan ahead. Perennials should be dug up and potted NO LATER than May 4th. This will allow the plants to "settle" into their pots. Be sure they are watered regularly and receive sufficient sun/shade so they can acclimate to their potted home.

2. Use a pot size that accentuates the plant's full, lush growth for early spring. Use regular plastic pots, e.g., 6", 8", 10", 12", etc., for potting (no plastic bags please).

3. **Please use potting soil, NOT garden soil or dirt.** The more attractive our plants are, the better they will sell. Re-use "old" potting soil from last year, if necessary, or purchase all-purpose potting soil at Home Depot, Lowe's, etc., to cut down on your cost. (You do not need to purchase 'Miracle-Gro Soil-less Potting Mix.') The plants will be transplanted by the customer within a few weeks from the time you pot them up. To minimize the mess, put a piece of newspaper or a new coffee filter in the bottom of the pot to cover the hole so the soil does not fall out.

4. Potted/labeled perennials need to be dropped off at the Bloomingdale Park District Maintenance Building, 259 Springfield Dr., Bloomingdale, on Thursday, May 9th 3 to 6 PM. Plants dropped off later may not be available for sale. Plants not identified will not be accepted.

Important Notes:

We do not have the resources available to help dig up plants unless there is an unusual circumstance.

Please do not be offended if we "price" your plant for less than you think is appropriate. As the Sale progresses, or if we have an abundance of similar plants (e.g., day lilies/hostas), prices may be reduced to "Buy 1 [at highest price]; Get 1 [or 2] FREE."

The type of plant and its condition, along with the size of the pot will determine our pricing.

More inflation and more immigrants in our community meant more people than ever before sought free clothes and household goods at Repeat Boutique in 2023. Volunteers served 50% more people than in 2022.

Many clients were fleeing challenging circumstances in their homelands, including 268 families from Ukraine, 116 from Russia, 84 from Burma, 40 from Syria, 38 from Sudan, 22 from Afghanistan, and 21 from Iraq. Immigrants from Latin America included 131 families from Venzuela, 104 from Mexico, 43 from Columbia, and 31 from Cuba.

Repeat Boutique encourages the community to donate clothing and housewares to keep the inventory supplied. All items are donated and staff members are volunteers. Financial donations keep the doors open. Their only expense is rent.

Marcy taught us many health benefits of herbal teas including those for fever, digestion, nausea, inflammation, calming, nursing mothers, pain relieving, stress, antiviral, restful sleep, cramps, immune system, menopause, colds, and coughs. We learned about creating herbal teas, how to brew teas, and blending teas.

Everyone had a taste of two different infusions of herbal tea: Holy Basel Relaxing Blend Tea and a custom blend for our group made from Lemon Balm, Peppermint, Lavendar, Hibiscus, and Lemon Verbena. Warm up your winter days with a cup of soothing herbal tea. Here is a simple blend with uplifting flavor for you to try:

Chamomile Citrus Zest Tea

tablespoon dried chamomile flowers
teaspoons dried lemon balm
teaspoon dried orange peel
Honey to taste

Steep chamomile flowers and orange peel in hot water for 5-7minutes. Strain and sweeten with

honey. Relax and enjoy the calming aroma and flavor!

Spice Up Your Life: Creative Dry Herb Uses

Dry herbs aren't just for seasoning—they can elevate your dishes to new heights! Try these fun tips:

Herb-Infused Olive Oil

Create your own herb-infused olive oil by combining dried rosemary, thyme, and garlic in a small amount of olive oil in a canning jar. Let it sit for a day, then drizzle over salads or use as a dipping sauce for crusty bread. Discard leftovers after a week.

Herbal Infused Honey

Elevate your culinary creations with a homemade herb infused honey. Simply warm honey and add dried herbs like thyme, cinnamon or lavender. Let it steep for a few hours, then strain. Drizzle this aromatic honey over desserts, toast, or even stir it into your favorite cup of tea for a unique twist.

Plot-to-Plate Garden March 2024

The Plot-to-Plate Committee has met and drawn up plans for this year's garden. Most of the seeds needed have been purchased and we have a list of transplants that will need to be purchased later this spring. Now we wait for the proper planting times. It has been hard to wait with so many warm days in the last weeks, but it is too soon yet for most of our crops.

We look forward to another successful growing season but will need your help to do so. First, we need you to save plastic quart and pint containers with attached lids. Think containers from strawberries, blueberries, and grape/cherry tomatoes you purchase in the produce department. You can bring clean containers to any of our meetings. We will be collecting these throughout the year. Secondly, and most importantly, we need your help maintaining the garden. There will be a sign-up at the May and June meetings for people who are willing to take one week this growing season to water and weed our garden. You will



need to come several times during that week to do so and we encourage you to work with a partner to complete these tasks. No experience needed as instructions will be provided to all who sign up. With a 19 week season, that means we need 38 people if every week has two volunteers.

Thank you for your support of this project. Your help allows us to get fresh, organic produce to a local food pantry that distributes it to people in need.

Perfectly Roasted Vegetables Every Time

Beyond the Brambleberry

Helpful Tips:


- Roasting times are based on the oven set at 425° F.
- Use olive oil (sparingly), salt, & pepper to season.
- Keep the vegetables cut around the same size so they roast evenly and at the same rate.
- Mix up the vegetables with a spatula half way through the cook time.

Roasting Times By Vegetable:

- Asparagus spears: 10-12 minutes
- Beets (whole, poked with a fork, wrapped in foil): 60 minutes
- Beets, cubed: 30 minutes
- Bell peppers, slices: 15-20 minutes
- Broccoli florets: 20-25 minutes

- Brussel sprouts, rimmed and halved: 18-25 mins
- Butternut Squash, cubed: 40 minutes
- Cauliflower florets: 20-25 minutes
- Eggplant, cubed: 20-30 minutes
- Green Beans: 12-15 minutes
- Mushrooms, sliced: 20-25 minutes
- Onion, cut into wedges: 18-20 minutes
- Potato, cubed: 30-35 minutes
- Potato, whole, poked with a fork: 40-45 minutes
- Pumpkin, cubed: 30 minutes
- Spaghetti Squash, deseeded & halved: 30-40 mins
- Sweet Potato, cubed: 30-35 minutes
- Sweet Potato, whole, poked with a fork: 40-45 mins
- Tomatoes (plum, whole, cherry, etc.) cut in half or cubed: 30-40 minutes
- Zucchini, cubed: 10-15 minutes

I had looked around the group assembled at one of our meetings and noticed how many single women there were—many of them living alone—and I just knew that because we are such a terrific group, that we would all benefit from keeping a closer eye on each other.

I thought it through and suggested that we simply choose someone from the group and "check in" every now and then. Become, as it were "my sister's keeper." Not everyone did this, but a number of us did indeed stay closer in touch and help out on occasions.

After Ernie Pulido passed away Carole began checking in on Bobbie and taking her to doctor's appointments as well as picking her up for meetings etc. Bobbie and I had been friends for many years and often attended functions together so when Carole could not help Bobbie, it was easy for me to do so.

Never in a million years, did I think that I would eventually be one of the more serious "players" in this program. In January 2019 (five years ago!) I started taking Bobbie for her appointments because she had a serious hernia for which surgery was indicated. During the following months (eventually years) as Bobbie's memory loss became more acute and she needed closer attention and care, Carole and Maureen, and others, visited often and I engaged a nurse to make sure of meals etc.

And then Covid happened! Neither Bobbie nor I were vaccinated and so no one could visit and as Bobbie's hernia surgery had complications that entailed two other surgeries as well as hospital stays, I became her advocate and care giver and daily companion. I really don't know where the years went but I do know that while I don't consider myself a nurturing person, I do know that these years have been—for me—amongst the most rewarding of my life.

As you all know, Bobbie's family decided to place her at Sunrise for her safety and her future. I continue to visit with her regularly and she does still know me. She has declined and now does not remember very much. My heart will break when the day comes and she no longer knows me!
