

COOKIE RECIPES

Winter is a great time to bake a batch of cookies! Here are several of Jamie Schneck's family favorites!

PECAN SANDIES

Mom's best cookies!

Ingredients:

1 stick of unsalted butter
1/2 cup light brown sugar
1 1/2 teaspoons vanilla
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 cup flour
1 cup toasted pecans, chopped

Directions:

Cream butter together with sugar, then add vanilla and salt. Add flour a little at a time until it is creamed. Add toasted pecans. Form balls and put on a cookie sheet. Press down with the bottom of a glass lightly dipped in water. Bake at 350° for 15 to 17 minutes.

Potato Chip Cookies

Mom's oldie but goodie!

Ingredients:

1 lb margarine
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup potato chips, crushed
2 teaspoons vanilla
3 1/2 cups flour

Directions:

Mix together in order and drop onto cookie sheet. Bake at 325° for 15 minutes.

Toffee

My sister's mother-in-law's favorite!

Ingredients:

1 cup brown sugar
2 sticks butter
Saltine crackers, salted
6 Hersey bars
almonds or pecans, chopped

Directions:

Melt sugar and butter in sauce pan. Bring to a rolling boil. Remove from heat and let stand 5 minutes. Spray 9 x 13" pan with Pam, then layer crackers in rows on bottom of pan. Spread sugar-butter mixture over top of crackers and bake at 350° for 7 to 10 minutes. Remove from oven and layer Hersey bars over top of mixture. Let melt and spread with spatula. Sprinkle nuts over top and let pan cool.

(When I made this, I used an 11 x 17" cookie sheet and made 1 1/2 batches of recipe (to quick set chocolate, let pan cool to touch and then put in freezer for about 5 minutes). To cut, I twisted sides of cookie sheet to loosen and slid toffee on to cutting board and sliced into squares.)
